
Dear Mom and Dad,

It's been 2 weeks now since your children left you to discover the whole world and I thought you would be happy to hear from us. We started our trip in South Asia, in India and even though I didn't want to stay in a country for more than one week, we are still there. There is just too much to see and you would never guess what Denzel and I already discovered!

India is much bigger than Germany and the difference between the northern and southern part is so incredible that it's kind of impossible to leave: You can walk on ice in Shimla one day, and relax on the beach in Goa the other.

The first thing we visited is the Taj Mahal in Agra: I was desperate to see it because it's the building I used to want in Monopoly! This mausoleum looks even more amazing when you're actually in front of it: it is built of white marbles and symbolizes purity, love and pain. A tourist guide also told us that the emperor had it built in memory of his third wife in 1632 and that it took them 22 years to finish it! People had a lot of help from elephants, which transported the majority of the stones and materials needed. Thanks to them we got to see one of the most symmetrical structures, we even watched the Taj Mahal change its colour in a shy pinkish blue in the early morning!
